'A Foundation for Cambridge' is who we are and what we do...

Our mission hasn't changed. We harness the power of sport to make positive impact on the community we serve. This new strategy builds upon a strong platform of consistent and trusted support that the foundation has provided over the past 14 years, and we are now springboarding our aspirations to have impact on more individuals across Cambridge.

Cambridge is officially the UK's most unequal city. As a world-renowned city, it is famed and admired for education, research, and technology. However, the top 6% of earners who live in Cambridge take home 19% of the total income, while the bottom 20% of the local population accounts for just 2%. Shockingly, the average life expectancy for men and women in the most deprived areas of Cambridge compared to the most affluent ones is 11.6 years less (ONS, 2021). This is simply unacceptable.

Cambridge United Foundation was established to further deepen the impact of the Club's work in its community. Serving as the charitable arm of the football club, we leverage the club's profile within the region, and use the power of the badge to enhance lives across Cambridge through the programmes we deliver. This strategy outlines our plan for the next three years as a foundation for Cambridge, with a vision to unite the city for a brighter future.

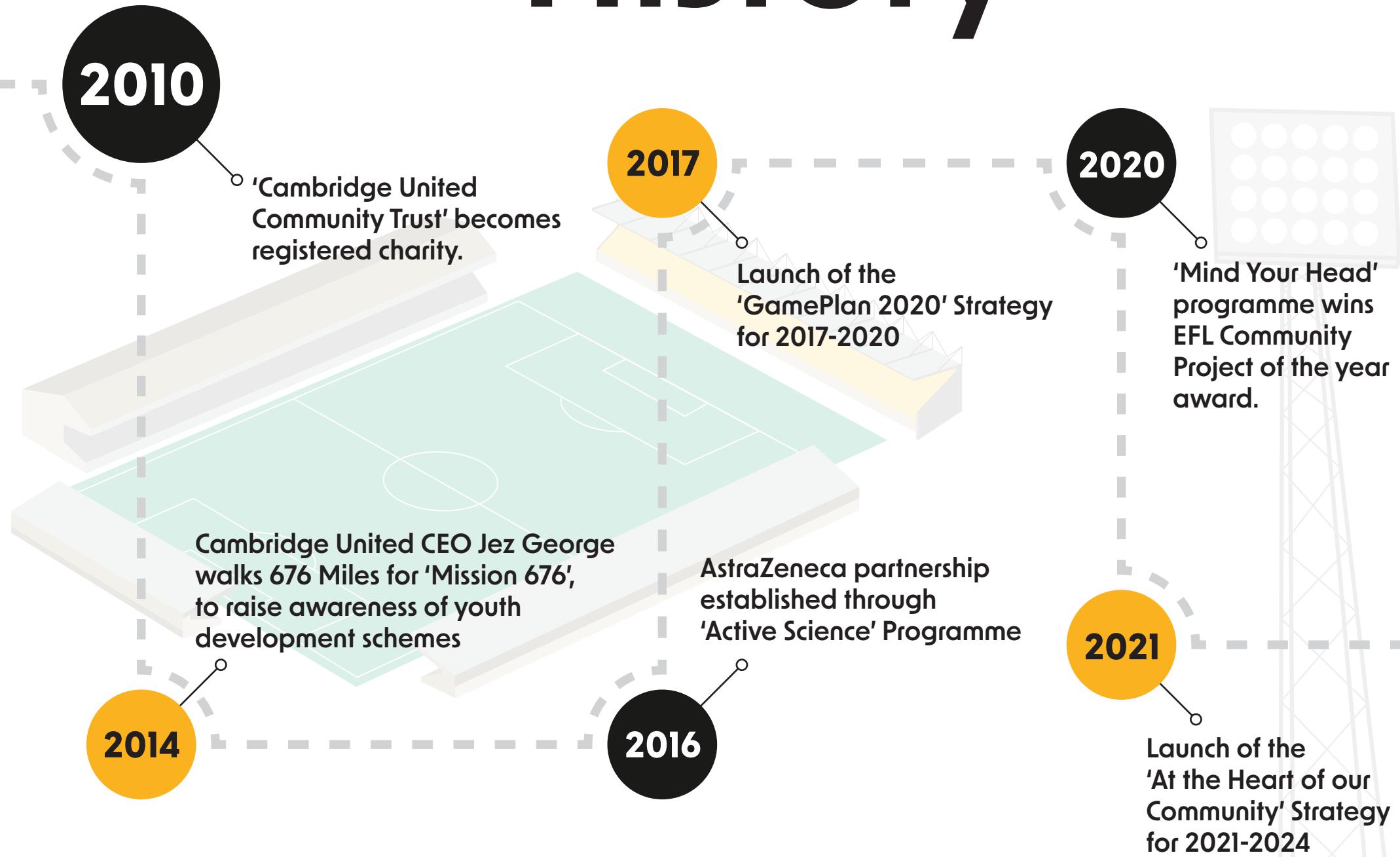

UNDERSTANDING THE DEMANDS

Local Need

We are committed to creating a positive impact across Cambridge, and focusing on the more in-need wards - Abbey, King's Hedges, Trumpington

Abbey Ward & Kings Hedges amongst the 20% most deprived areas in the country

5% of individuals living in the Abbey Ward are unemployed, compared to a national average of 3.5%

Abbey Ward reported the highest number of benefit households at 944, or 12.72% of all benefit households

Central Cambridge has a large proportion of Asian/Asian-British individuals in comparison with the national average

Trumpington Ward has the largest child benefit population at 639 children, representing 14% of the total child population

East Chesterton has the largest number of pensioners (308, representing 21%) living in benefit households

PRIORITY AREA 1 YOUNG PEOPLE



Need

Children living below the poverty line are significantly more likely to suffer from a learning difficulty

Children exposed to poverty are more likely to offend as adults.

25% of children who grow up in poverty, had criminal convictions by the age of 35.

Individuals who leave school with no qualifications are significantly more likely to suffer from depression, anxiety and alcohol abuse.

Empower future generations to increase aspirations and maximise potential, increasing equality of opportunity.

PRIORITY AREA 2 ADULTS



Need

67% of men and 60% of women are overweight or obese in the UK.

(NHS data)

Over 40% of adults with one or more disability take part in less than 30 mins of physical activity per week.

(Sport England data)

Almost 1 in 5 members of the adult population (18.2%, 8.8 million) reported having no qualifications according to the ONS in 2021.

Desired Impact

Support demand on local frontline health services.

Increase opportunities for marginalised groups to be physically active.

Raise levels of happiness, life satisfaction and sense of worth, bringing people together through sport.

Increase personal development opportunities to help prepare for employment.

PRIORITY AREA 3 OLDER ADULTS



Need

In 1960 the average life expectancy was 71.13 years old, this has now risen to 80.9 years.

There has been 26% growth in number of over 65s from 2011-2021, with estimated further 26% growth by 2031, with much of this growth in the over-80s age bands.

"The forward trends set out cannot be ignored-it is simply a matter of time before our health and care system buckles under the needs of an increasingly older population"

In 2022, 49.63% of adults in the UK reported feeling lonely occasionally, sometimes, often or always.
Approximately 7.1% of people in Great Britain experience chronic loneliness - feeling lonely 'often or always'.

Desired Impact

Increase sense of belonging to truly connected communities.

Raise levels of happiness, life satisfaction and sense of worth, achieved by bringing people together in the name of Cambridge United.

Support the increasing demand on local services by reducing the need for non-medical appointments, providing more equal access to health services for the whole community.
